WE STAND UNITED AGAINST DOMESTIC ABUSE

Women's White Ribbon Day is today on Thursday 25th November, and the annually event starts 16 days of action against gender based violence.

Every year Jess Phillips, MP for Birmingham Yardley, reads out the names of the women who have died violently in the previous 12 months and the list always takes too long to read. White Ribbon Day is a reminder to us all, in our communities, organisations and workplaces to stand up and join the fight to end violence against women and girls.

This year the leading message is that all men can make a difference, a theme which has evolved since the murder of Sarah Everard earlier this year, a crime which brought the horror of violence towards women back into the national consciousness. And the conversation has opened up the opportunity for men to take action too and make a stand. This is not a gender war, it is a fight which all right-minded men and women can join in to end physical and mental violence.

Men can make a huge difference. For every insane murderer or rapist there are legions of men who treat others as they would want to be treated themselves, are sensitive, caring and inclusive to the core. And Of course, November is Men's Health Awareness Month. The latest Office for National Statistics figures show that one in three victims of domestic abuse are male, and one in six/seven (compared with one in four women) will suffer from domestic abuse at some time in their life.

But in the very worst cases, more women are killed by partners or ex partners than men, by around seven times, and society insists that sometimes women need safe spaces where men cannot tread.

Just as in the fight against racism in all its forms, the issue of violence, particularly against women, is not a debate. It's just plain wrong.
